10:15 Evolution of the prehistoric sticky notes

Liam Pettit – Business Account Manager, Matchware inc

Are you having problems creating and optimising the work breakdown structure? Are you constantly re-creating data throughout the life cycle of the project for presentations or reporting purposes? These issues can be easily solved by applying mind mapping technology to the project life cycle.

Mind Mapping has been widely used for the past 40 years in all aspects of business and education. Traditionally used as a brainstorming tool, but more recently it's been optimised for the project manager. Mind Mapping is an increasingly popular topic in project management because when paired with technology it will increase productivity by 25%. Specifically, it helps the project manager in the WBS process and converting the WBS into a Gantt. Mind Mapping technology has further benefits because of the strong integration with MS Office.

If you feel like you need to optimise your WBS and are looking for ways to communicate the project plan more successfully...this is the session for you.

11:15 Delivering Multiple Portfolios of Projects using Agile and Waterfall methodologies with Project Online – sound too good to be true?

Duncan Griffin – PPM Consultant, CPS

Organisations are facing extreme pressures to deliver efficient change across diverse business portfolios. Business Changes Initiatives, IT Project Portfolios and BAU all require tools to govern delivery and execute their objectives. Whilst each Portfolio might want their own Project delivery platform the organisation still needs some common standards and oversight. But when delivery teams need both Waterfall and Agile project management tools, how can you provide them with the different tools whilst still keeping them within a single delivery framework?

In this session, Duncan Griffin explains how PS+, a simple solution for Project Online introduces the PS+ Agile framework to provide best of breed agile components which allow you to easily iterate across sprints via simple Kanban boards and track burn down via OOB reports.

12:15 Automating your reporting and dashboards

Malcolm West – Managing Director, PROJECT in a box

Governance and reporting of projects and programmes is essential to every organisation and yet so many find it a struggle with timeliness of production, accuracy of data and consistency of presentation. At PROJECT in a box we have helped many organisations to automate their reporting and in this session we will share some of the tricks and tools which will enable you to get great results with minimal cost and effort.

14:15 The Intelligent Organisation: Realising the value of information

John Beckford introduces the core ideas of 'The Intelligent Organisation' and shows how the synthesis of people, process and information delivers gains in effectiveness, reducing costs while increasing customer satisfaction and improving the bottom line.

Applicable to all sectors, 'The Intelligent Organisation' is a radical model of organization built on exploiting the information generating capabilities of contemporary technologies. John will illustrate his talk with examples and case studies drawing on international applications of these ideas in transport, water, utilities, social care, paper manufacturing, pharmaceutical research and professional services.

John manages to be academically rigorous in his thinking whilst also being provocative and entertaining.

15:15 The nature of change is changing. What does it mean for us?

Michelle Brailsford – Co-Lead, Change Management Institute SW (UK)

When faced with complex change, many leaders are still trying to lead change using management tools that are no longer fit for purpose. How can we, as change coaches and project leaders, help our Leaders when there are no 'right answers'? When the future isn't predictable? When it's impossible to produce controllable results?

Leaders need to develop new habits. The role of Change Manager needs to shift to Change Coach. And together, we need to build change platforms, not change programmes.

During this session, Michelle will share some thoughts about Management 2.0 and Change 2.0 with the audience. Be prepared to walk away with more questions, than answers!

10:15 Project, Programme and Portfolio Management – Three disciplines, one race

Steve Kirk – Professional Services Director, Sciforma UK

Implementing a project-based organisation is like a triathlon, with the three separate disciplines of portfolio, programme and project management, that are linked together and that need to be executed in balance and with the same level of expertise. In combination, these disciplines provide an enterprise wide process for implementing strategy that is systematic and efficient.

This presentation describes this cultural and organisational approach that rewards those organisations that recognise the need for each discipline and work continuously to improve all three.

11:15 Intelligent Change Management – using outcome-driven change to achieve successful step-change

Mike Pryor – Principal Consultant, Bestoutcome

There has never been a greater need to manage change effectively within organisations, yet it is so often seen as a 'black-art'. But we all know that successful change doesn't happen by accident. A key factor for achieving a fundamental, sustainable step-change is to always focus on the outcomes of the change : what will be different, how will it feel, and why is that better than today?

In this talk Mike Pryor, Principal Consultant at Bestoutcome, will give real-life examples of clients who use an outcome-driven approach on their change programmes. He will explain how this helps them manage variances, ambiguity and turbulence and ensure that the end-goals of the change programme are achieved and successfully embedded in the organisation.

There has been an Industry shift for the core PPM Persona – the project Manager. The need to leverage project & program management to orchestrate the rate & pace of bringing new products & services to market has effected a change in who project managers primarily are.

Chris Reeves will discuss how CA Technologies has used Ethnographic research in their bid to transform the User Experience for 70% of project managers.

Using a “Design for Humans” approach CA have conducted a study of people doing their jobs in their work environment (using sticky notes, to do lists, etc.) not interacting with software.

The aim of this research was to focus on the Persona and provide solutions for a person, not features for a release and to answer the question what is the job you “hired” the software to do?

15:00 Seven habits of highly effective PMO Managers

Inspired by Stephen Covey's inspirational book, Seven Habits of Highly Effective People®, we take a look at the role of the PMO Manager and share what makes a highly effective PMO Manager in the profession today.

10:15 KEYNOTE: The CEO Survey – the view from above

Michael Cooch – People Partner, Portfolio & Programme Management, PwC

PwC has spoken to over 1,400 CEOs around the world across a diverse range of sectors and industries.

CEOs are concerned about over-regulation, cited by 79% of CEOs – making it the fourth year in a row that it's risen. Geopolitical uncertainty has become the second biggest concern, cited by 74% of business leaders, a figure that may be greater in light of 'Brexit'.

Michael will explain what this means for portfolio and programme managers, how CEOs look to face uncertainties, build on opportunities and get the best value possible from ongoing transformation.

11:15 PIMp my systems – a Southern Water deployment

Stephen Harrison – Director Asset Handling/Consultant, MWH Global and supported by Paul Segal, Investment Programme Management Southern Water

This presentation takes a look at a deployment of the Asset Handling "Programme Insight Manager" (PIM) SaaS product from a systems deployment perspective and a client perspective. It identifies the challenges faced in deploying a new system across the whole organisation from the viewpoint of a systems provider and then follows this up with the experience on the client side managing the change process and user expectations through to Business As Usual operation.

12:15 Stakeholder-led project management: Changing the way we manage projects

Fiona Magee, CITI consultant

If stakeholders matter at all then they must make a difference to the way we plan, structure and execute projects.

Thought-leaders CITI Ltd provide a stakeholder-centred analysis of projects and explains which identification, analysis, communication and engagement models are relevant to different types of projects. This has relevance from an office move to transformational change of business and can even include complex social change.

Based on case studies from around the world, CITI consultant Fiona Magee illustrates what goes wrong when stakeholders are not engaged successfully, and what lessons we can learn from these examples.

The talk will be accompanied by a new book by CITI consultant Louise Worsley. This book is intended for project professionals who find themselves involved in managing projects with complex stakeholder concerns. Copies will be available both to buy and to order from CITI Ltd's stand.

14:00 How to cut cost management of capital programmes by 10%

Graham Walker, BT Lancashire Services Project Director

Lancashire Co Council struggled with control of their project portfolio. They wanted better budget efficiencies. They needed to reduce manual handoffs. Information was spread over 100+ systems and hundreds of spreadsheets. In order to improve visibility and control of their projects, BT and Cora Systems implemented a software solution and change transformation programme that has brought greater flexibility and enhanced reporting for their users, and, crucially, reduced cost management of their capital programmes.

This presentation will provide some fascinating insights on how their objectives were achieved.

15:15 Portfolio Management: The rock star of change

Craig Kilford – Founder & CEO, CourseConductor.com & Steve Jenner – Author, Practitioner, Trainer, Portfolio Solutions

Portfolio Management has become a rock star that everyone seems to be talking about today ...this because portfolio management is crucial for strategy execution, it helps executives make more informed project investment decisions, it helps everyone understand which projects are most important to deliver and at the same time, it boosts the energy and the overall happiness of the team.

As authors of the AXELOS Global Standard "Management of Portfolios", Craig and Steve discuss Portfolio Management's rise to fame as well as zooming into some of the solutions to the big challenges that people and organizations face when moving to a portfolio management state of being.

10:15 Managing in the mixed economy – agile and traditional approaches working together

John Sheffield – CCO, Pccubed

The programme is a business transformation that relies on a technical solution to enable it. There are fixed deadlines that have very large commercial implications. The programme purpose is to execute a corporate strategic objective (and not just some technology).

The programme cannot succeed without the technical solution, but the business transformation (process, organisational design, etc.) is equally important.

The organisation does not have any experience in delivering a programme of this scale using in-house agile development techniques, but the CIO is keen to introduce wider its use.

Hear Pccubed's opinion on how to manage in the "mixed economy".

11:15 The challenge of managing the UKs radioactive waste for the long term. A discussion using case studies from the Nuclear Industry

Ann McCall, Waste Management Director, Radioactive Waste Management Ltd

Ann is the Waste Management Director for Radioactive Waste Management Ltd and leads a major programme to provide solutions for the long term management of the UKs radioactive waste. This session will describe the arrangements for how the UK deals with retrieving and packaging the UKs legacy of radioactive waste to ensure that it is safe for the long term.

This session will discuss a number of case studies showing how this is put into practice.

12:15 Establish a value-adding PMO in the NHS

Catherine Onanda – Head of PMO, NHS East Surrey Clinical Commissioning Group

In this session, Catherine Onanda, explains how they selected their PMO tool, PM3, and established a PMO 'value centre' in East Surrey CCG.

The NHS has to deliver a number of projects and change programmes. Project based tools and Excel were not up to the job of controlling and managing multiple projects and programmes. We decided to create a PMO that used the right tools and processes to track our project and programme outcomes, especially cost savings and benefits.

Key to our PMO's success was winning the hearts and minds of our project and programme managers. In this session, Catherine explains how East Surrey won the hearts and minds and built a value-adding PMO.

14:00 Maximising the value of change investments

Andrew Hudson – Managing Director, ChangeDirector

There is no other purpose in doing a change programme than to deliver value and realize benefits. This is the true measure of a programme's success. In this session Andrew will describe the fundamentals of value delivery from the programme and beneficiary perspectives. He will explain some of the key risks and challenges for organisations in realising benefits and provide practical advice on how to overcome them.

This session is relevant to leaders of change and transformation including PMOs, business change and benefits management. Andrew recently authored the chapter on Managing Programme Benefits in the latest Gower Handbook on Programme Management.

15:00 How to identify the strengths and weaknesses across your 3PM organisation

Mike Saville – Consultant, ILX Group

The core of ILX's speaking session will be how organisations can increase effectiveness by combining best practice, Organisational Capability Models – which include P3M3 v3, The Change Management Maturity Model and Project Complexity Models.

Mike Saville will explore how organisations can benefit from combining these models, enabling leadership teams to answer not just how good are our projects? – but establish solutions to persistent problems and build the capability that they need. These themes will be illustrated by case studies from multi-nationals.

This session explores this analogy and discusses the factors that are needed to make project and programme management work for your organisations.

12:30 People Deliver Change

Chris Ferguson – Director, Novare Consulting

The pace of change is accelerating, becoming more complex and demanding, creating uncertainty for all involved. Most frameworks focus on the tasks involved in delivering change but do not address the 'people' related aspects.

Chris and Novare Consulting have supported many organisations to deliver successful change programmes, and he will use this experience to explain a range of approaches to equip people delivering changes to appreciate the reactions of stakeholders to those changes and develop appropriate engagement activities.

MBTI is one such approach for understanding individual differences and strengths. Chris will explain how understanding MBTI preferences reveals valuable insights into your own motivations and those of others. He will explore how to use these insights to help overcome resistance, collaborate with stakeholders and embed sustainable change.

14:00 What am I worth? The APM Salary and Market Trends Survey 2016

Vince Hines – Managing Director, Wellington Project Management

The Association for Project Management (APM) and recruitment experts Wellington Project Management recently published the APM Salary and Market Trends Survey 2016. Nearly 5,000 project management professionals participated making it the UK's largest project management salary study to date.

Wellington Project Management bring over 15 years of best practice recruitment expertise to complement the APM's commitment to providing knowledge, standards and guidance to our industry. Vince Hines, Managing Director, Wellington Project Management will present the findings of this research, including salaries, contract rates and market confidence. 15:00 People Power – how to improve the practice of project management through insights into personal style

10:30 Over budget, over time, over and over again. Would the principles of MSP, PRINCE2 and PRINCE2 Agile have helped?

Rajiv Khanna – Director, Raj Khanna Associates Ltd

Numbers of initiatives in public and private sector organisations are still failing to deliver on time, to cost and often not delivering the required outcomes & benefits. One of the key reasons for this is the application of poor or inappropriate governance.

This presentation will discuss the key differences between programmes and projects. It will also address the key principles of Managing Successful Programmes, PRINCE2 and PRINCE2 Agile and how these can be tailored to suit the needs of an organisation; increasing the chances of success of their programmes and projects and minimising the levels of risk.

11:30 Building a Learning Organisation: How better talent management increases project delivery success and reduces risk

Ruth Phillips – Head of Service Delivery, FGI Training & Consultancy

People deliver projects; not processes, technologies or tools. It's no coincidence that those organisations that recognise and invest in the development of their people report more successful project delivery performance. However, many organisations still lack an enterprise-wide approach to knowledge management and talent development, particularly related to project management.

This session looks at strategies for improving and sustaining individuals' project management skills and competencies and how to create an organisation-wide culture of sharing and learning lessons to drive project success and reduce the risk of failure.

12:30 Driving transformation through engaged teams

Ranjit Sidhu – Managing Director, ChangeQuest Ltd

Organisations need to change to remain competitive. If change is not managed well, there can be a negative impact on morale, performance, culture and the organisation's bottom line results. Transformation is different to 'a project'. There's no point spending large budgets on 'delivering' new systems if the additional work isn't done so that people feel comfortable using them. It's essential that people are supported along on the journey

In this session Ranjit Sidhu identifies how companies can manage and empower the teams and leaders responsible for change. She addresses key themes for effective organisational change and achieving successful transformation.

14:00 Kraljic – is there benefit in using some standardised tools in the production of your business case?

Cath Convery – Director, Explosive Learning Solutions

The presentation talks to some of the advantages of using the Kraljic Matrix. Cath Convery from Explosive Learning Solutions frequently runs workshops and training on strategy documents and recognises that for some learners understanding the theory behind what you are doing is an important step in true learning. This presentation uses case study examples to talk through one of the tools that is often used in the writing of the Commercial Case in the 5 Case Model.

15:00 Applying psychology to enhance Project Management

James Barr – Senior Consultant, Self-insight Ltd

This sessions presents a brief overview of where knowledge of psychology can benefit the project manager at various points in the life-cycle (e.g. selecting staff, leading and motivating a team, influencing stakeholders, resilience, innovation etc).

James encourages taking an evidence-based approach and giving critical consideration to models and solutions before adopting them. He then focuses on providing a basic understanding of underlying cognitive and neuroscience processes which can help project managers become more self-aware and effective in problem solving, decision making and approach to risk.

10:30 Project Planning an art or a science?

Rod Baker – Director, Professional Project & Programme Management Limited and Terry Kent, – Project Planning & Control Trainer, Training Byte Size

A look at the APM guidance for Project Planning and Control and the relationship with APMG and the subsequent accreditation that followed. How the APM Planning Monitoring and Control SIG put the book together drawing on years of experience and looking at the customers and suppliers perspective. They will talk about how the guidance will improve the quality of schedules and technical competence of team members.

Rod has had first-hand direct experience in all key project roles, having started as a project planner himself, and developing a range of training courses in every aspect of Project Management. Terry can give a first-hand account of candidates who attended the course and went back into the business, using their knowledge from the guidance to improve all aspects of project delivery.

This session is relevant to Project Planners and Project Controllers. Also people associated with PMOs, business change and benefits management.

11:30 How to balance skills capacity with demand, in a volatile multi-project environment

Barry Muir – Director, Innate Management Systems Ltd.

Managing multiple projects with a limited pool of resources can be an exciting ride. Sufficient skills must be available to ensure timely completion of assignments and avoid client disappointment, but poor levels of resource utilization can severely impact operational profits.

Drawing on recent experiences with Petrofac, the Oil and Gas facilities provider, and CB&I, a leading provider of technology and infrastructure for the energy industry, we will see how project and services organizations can maintain the right balance in a constantly changing environment.

12:30 Earned Value Management Fundamentals Is your project ready to support EVM?

Patrick Kennerson – Head of PMO, Balfour Beatty

In the 15 plus years that I have been practicing Project Controls in the UK I have found that only a few projects are fit to support EVM.

This presentation will try to explore in a practical way how to ensure that the building blocks that support EVM are imbedded within your project and your organization.

We will also explore the following issues most projects underestimate for proper EVM;

- Cultural change required to underpin EVM
- Schedule baseline issues that weaken EVM
- Progress measurement techniques that works for EVM
- Business systems input into EVM
- Comprehensive change needed to keep EVM in sync

The focus will be on providing a practical roadmap on how to address all these challenges that prevent the implementation of best practice. It will also present real life examples of how EV metrics should be presented and what project managers/directors should be aiming to obtain.

10:30 A guide to Integrated Baseline Reviews

Breda Ryan – Project Controls Lead, Jacobs UK (Programme Management & Construction Management division) and Milla Maziluhas – Programme Controls Lead, Network Rail (National Operating Strategy and Digital Railway Programme)

An integrated baseline review is the process of performing a technical and schedule review, in order to establish a balanced understanding of the project's planning maturity. An IBR will review the project management plan, the methods and metrics used to measure contract performance and progress, the management control processes operating during the project's execution, the technical merits of the schedule, and finally the risks associated with the baseline.

During this session, we will explain the roles and responsibilities of those involved, the steps required before and after an IBR, as well as the preparation and execution of the review itself.

11:30 Tips, Traps and Lessons When Implementing an Enterprise P3M Reporting Solution

Paul Millsom MSc, MAPM – Sopra Steria UK

The case study looks at the challenges and techniques in deploying Execview P3M reporting across an organisation comprising multiple semi-autonomous divisions with disparate legacy solutions and where a previous P3M solution deployment had stalled.

This seminar examines approaches to address the organisational constraints and lessons learned coupled with techniques to accelerate the pace of deployment. It discusses the pragmatic goal focused tactics to establish momentum and soliciting selective stakeholder support. Finally, it deliberates on the need for balancing the goal of corporate consistency with need for providing local flexibility.

12:30 Delivering Certainty: how to de-risk your projects and live happily ever after

Juan Manrique – CEO, Hydra Management Ltd

Why do we keep missing deadlines, going over budget and generally failing in our project deliveries? We have done it so many times but we seem to have learned nothing in the process. We should have all the right pieces in place: resources, procedures, know-how. But somehow things rarely go according to plan.

How can we smash the barriers preventing us to deliver consistently successful project outcomes? How can we de-risk our operations and increase our confidence that all out projects are implemented in the best way possible?

Based on Hydra's philosophy and the experiences of our customers, Juan will explore how organisations can achieve optimisation of projects and processes to reduce risks and significantly increase profitability.

14:00 Resourcing with people and robots

When we look at project resource management we often see the question of "where do I best deploy my resources?" However, in the future we are going to start asking "should I deploy human resources to that activity or spend the effort on automation?"
